

Eco-Art Workshop & Adventure Program

Since August 31, 2003 a total of 5,996 youth have engaged in the Eco-Art Workshop Program and 6,984 participants have engaged in the Eco-Art Adventure Program

During the 2007-2008 Fiscal year, 924 youth participated in the Eco-Art Workshop Program and 1,942 youth participated in the Eco-Art Adventure Program

Major Objectives July 2008 - July 2009

- Provide another fleet of kayaks for Public and School Adventures
- Provide 2-4 Houston-Galveston region MS with the Eco-Art Workshop and Kayak Adventure Program, as well as, the schools administering the Environmental Literacy Curriculum; resulting in 15 events
 - Delivered program to 3 schools
 - Served 155 students



- Provide 3-4 area non-profits with the Program; resulting in 15 events
- Provide 2 city parks / recreation departments with the Program; resulting in 8 events
- Provide 2 public trips per month around Galveston Bay resulting in 16 events
 - Delivered 13 events
 - Served 72 participants

- Provide 4 area universities/colleges with the Program; resulting in 12 events
 - Delivered 3 adventures to one university
 - Served 45 participants

Gulf of Mexico Foundation Habitat Restoration Program

Gateway to the Gulf

‡ To date, this program has restored approximately 2.8 acres of marsh and 1.5 acres of sand dune habitat in the Galveston Bay area and South Padre Island, all with volunteers from the community and local schools.

‡ 12 marsh and dune sites in the Galveston Bay area have been restored through this program through partnerships with local organizations and parks, including:

- Baytown Nature Center
- Anahuac National Wildlife Refuge
- Clear Creek (through the Clear Creek Environmental Foundation)
- Beachtown
- Sweetwater lake (managed by GBF)
- Omega Bay (Galveston County MUD 12)
- Bird Island
- Pierce Marsh (managed by GBF)

‡ One of the greatest accomplishments through this program was the South Padre Island extension done during the aftermath of Hurricane Ike. While Galveston was inaccessible for restoration, two months worth of programming was done in South Padre Island to restore sand dunes that were affected by the surge of Ike. This project received a lot of support in this area, and was in the local newspapers numerous times. This extension eventually culminated in a large planting event on November 15, where over 100 volunteers showed up to restore sand dunes.

Eco-Art Residency Program

- Since August 31, 2003 this program has served 4,437 participants on Elementary and Middle School Campuses resulting in over 26 public art works installed to beautify the campuses
- In 2007-2008 served 1,471 students and will result in 6 more public works
- This program has additionally created five habitats on campuses for students and teachers to have an outdoor classroom
- This program has been funded by the 21st Century Grant Program, Marathon Oil, A+ Challenge Grant, Harris County Department of Education, Houston Endowment, Fermata Inc, Houston ISD, Pasadena ISD, and Galveston ISD, and the City of Galveston






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


Browning Elementary Eco-Art Ancillary Science Component Students produce and broadcast their own radio station




Browning Elementary 2007 -208 After School Eco-Art Residency

Students created an ocean mosaic mural and species guides to plants and animals




Garfield Elementary 2007 - 2008





Since August 31, 2003 a total of 2,824 participants from the general public have participated in public Eco-Art Adventures

During the 2007-2008 Fiscal year 816 participants from the general public engaged in Eco-Art Adventures
